Richardson & Robinson – Chapter 5: Gendered Bodies: Gendered Lives

- 'Identity Politics' Rights over one's body
 - Feminism: NEEDS to account for Different Bodies = Basis of Inequality
 - How did we arrive at various views of body and identity?
- Theories of Body and Self (personal ID)
 - Simple: 1 Body \leftrightarrow 1 Self
 - Body = Identity
 - o Complex: Mind/Body Distinction Cartesian Dualism
 - Body: Finite material substance
 - Divisible
 - o Extended in space
 - Body = Female = Sexuality
 - o Conflated: Embodiment
 - Body = Experience → Identity
- Feminist Sexual Difference Theorists
 - Mind > Body: Early Feminism (17th-18th c.)
 - Focus: Rational Female Mind
 - Self = Reason (NOT Body)
 - Body = Objects for others → Vulnerable (Risk: Pregnancy)
 - o **Body Rights**: 19th c. Feminism
 - Focus: Individual Body Rights
 - o Issues: Rape, sexual violence, birth control, abortion, & slavery
 - **Self > Body**: 20th c. Feminism
 - Body = Mark of difference (e.g., Sex, Race)
 - Bodies = Controlled → Oppression
 - O Bodies ≠ Rights Self = Rights

- Mind: Finite intellectual substance
 - Indivisible
 - Thought Subjective consciousness
 - Mind = Male = Rationality

- ALL THEORIES: Accept Cartesian Dualism
 - Acknowledge bodily differences
 - Place different significance on BODY
- Problem: HOW to discuss bodies & acknowledge BOTH FLUIDITY + MATERIALITY
- Feminist Critiques of the Body
 - Problem: Body Focus (Women = Body)
 - Solution: Reject Cartesian Dualism
 - Link Bodies & Selves (don't separate Mind & Body)
 - **Phenomenology** = Captures embodied experiences
 - 'Lived Body' = Situation = Nature (physical state) & Culture (social context)
 - Problem: Women's embodied experience = Not been very positive
- Feminist Phenomenology
 - Women's Embodied Experience = ONLY Perceived Limitation (NOT biological)
 - Embodied Experience = VISIBLE ID (Perception by oneself & others)
 - Contemporary <u>Feminism</u>: Bodies = Only gain Meaning through Perception
 - Biology (in itself) ≠ Significant
 Attach meaning = Significant
 - Problem: WANT to celebrate bodies WITHOUT being restricted by them
 - o **Goal**: Positive Account of Female Phenomenology [2 Approaches]
- Anglo-American Radical Feminism (1970's-1980's): Celebrates Females' Bodies
 - Sexuality = Power = Escape from Submission
 - Capacity to give birth = Value = Care & Interconnectedness
 - o Problem: Homogenized Female Experience
- Psychoanalytic Feminism (1990's): Criticized Masculinity
 - Recognizes Sexual Difference MIND as well as Body
 - Bodies = Imaginary/Socially Constructed = Reflect Norms [controlled by Individual]
 - o 'Body projects' = "Mind over matter" = Allows Control over Bodies

- Problems: Experience ≠ Universal
 - Performative Accounts
 - o Bundle Theory: Body ≠ Identity
 - How about minimizing the significance of the body?
- Problems: Fails to account for biology
 - Disability: Body = intrudes on daily life
 - Body Disharmony = Rules out Transsexuality/Seek Body Modification
 - Matter = Materializing (Body = process of living)
 - How about the extreme incorporation of the material?
- Technoscience & Cyborgs
 - New Challenge to "heteronormativity": Science & Technology
 - Gendered Embodiment = Socially Constructed
 - Society → Skeleton
 - No Distinction: Animal = Human = Machine
 - "Normal" = Biotechnology + Technoscience (overcoming limitations)
 - Conflated Theories: Poststructuralism/Postmodernism
 - Cyborg + Bodies: Natural (bodily reality) + Constructed (individuals & society)
 - BOTH resist categories
