
MARTI KHEEL: VEGETARIANISM AND ECOFEMINISM: TOPPLING PATRIARCHY WITH A FORK

- Traditional Ethical Theories
 - Reason > Emotion
 - Not the correct motivation
 - Feminism:
 - Takes issue with hierarchy [patriarchy]
 - Expresses compassion for those who are subordinated
 - Ecofeminism:



- Takes the hierarchy between genders as analogous to that between "man" and "nature"
- Criticisms [p. 328]
- Based in care ethic [agent-based]
- Invitational Approach
 - **Deconstructionism:**
 - NO universal norms, break down dominant norm [meat-eating]
 - Replace with invitation to become a vegetarian
 - **Focus:** Meat-eating as a practice (moral ideal) > universal rules/principles
 - Shifting the focus of the conversation
 - Instead of positively arguing FOR vegetarianism
 - Provides a negative argument AGAINST eating meat
- Compulsory Meat-eating
 - Norm: dominant, accepted without question


- Compulsory norm: "imposed, managed, organized, propagandized, and maintained by force" [p. 329]
- o Analogy: Heterosexuality
 - Rightful access to women :: animal flesh
 - Obstacles without the norm:
 - Considered incomplete
 - o Considered unfulfilled
 - o Incomprehensible by those in the norm

• Patriarchy & Meat-eating

- Women and animals are tied together through religion, social structures, and animal husbandry
 - Meat-eating =
 - o Basis of relationships
 - Basis of hierarchy [power dynamics]
 - Basis of masculine selfidentity
 - Associated w/ class, status, and gender
 - Vegetarianism = spiritual purity [at best]
 - o In a sexualized context
 - Overcoming that which is "irrational" for the service of the "rational"

• Analogy: Marriage

- Possession
- Obliteration of identity/independence
- Ownership



- Containment
- Control over reproduction
- Treated as objects
- Meant to be consumed
- Analysis of patriarchy and meat-eating does NOT provide a direct argument for vegetarianism
 - It does invite vegetarianism as a response
 - Act of empathy, resistance, and affirmation of interconnectedness

Contextual Moral Vegetarianism

- Concerns about charges that vegetarians seek to impose a white, privileged norm on others who eat animal flesh for sustenance or cultural reasons
- How inviting vegetarianism if different from imposing a norm on others
- How contextual moral vegetarian approaches sometime fail to consider issues of race, gender, and class

• Cultural Insensitivity

- Is it somehow culturally insensitive for Western animal advocates to suggest vegetarianism?
- What about all of the non-Western countries where vegetarianism is the norm?
- Conclusion: if you are "opposed to the domination of women" then you should "be more inclined to empathize with the plight of nonhuman animals"
